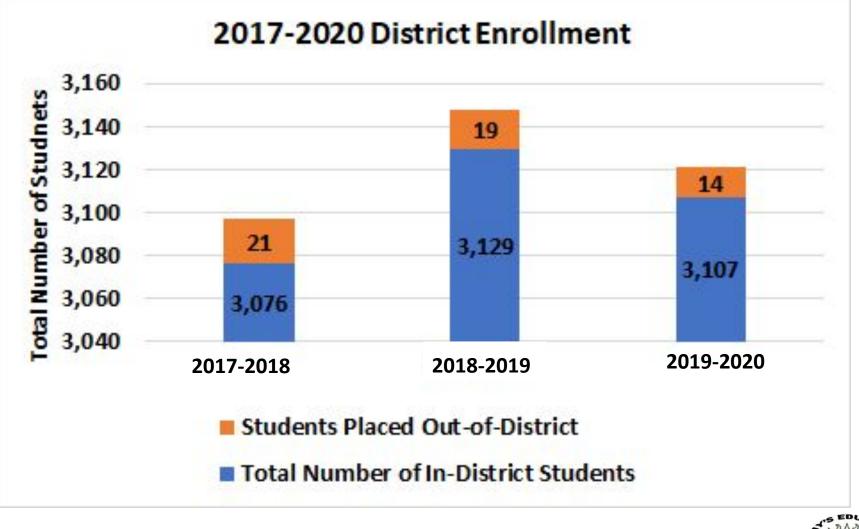

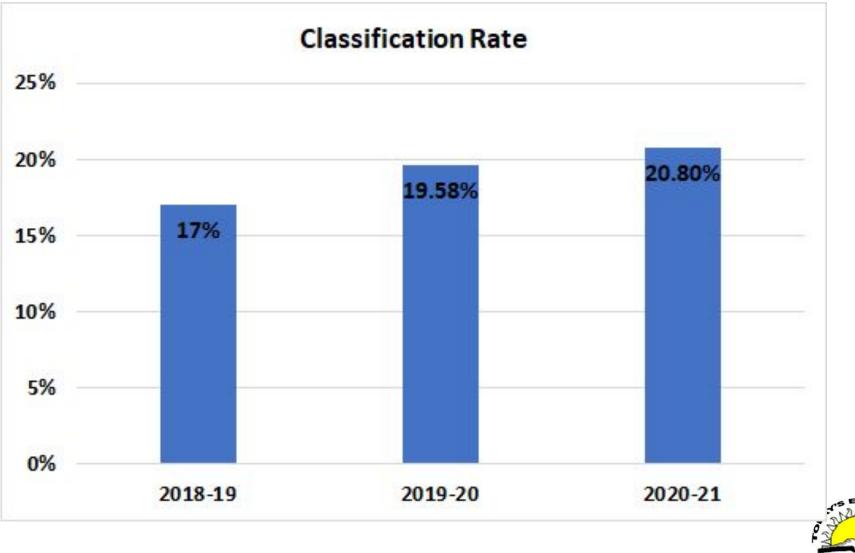
District Enrollment



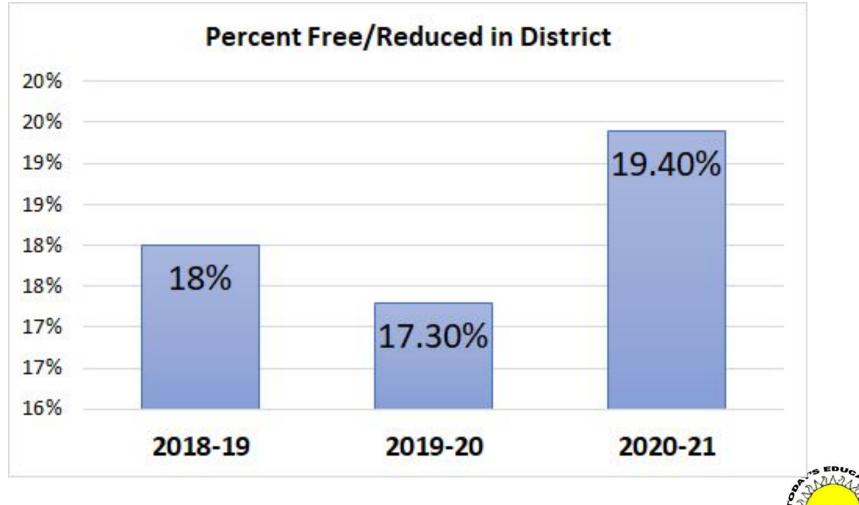




District Overview (As of May 1, 2020 comparison to May 1, 2018)



IS TOMORROW'S FUTURE Flemington-Raritan Schools District Overview (As of May 1, 2020 comparison to May 1, 2018)

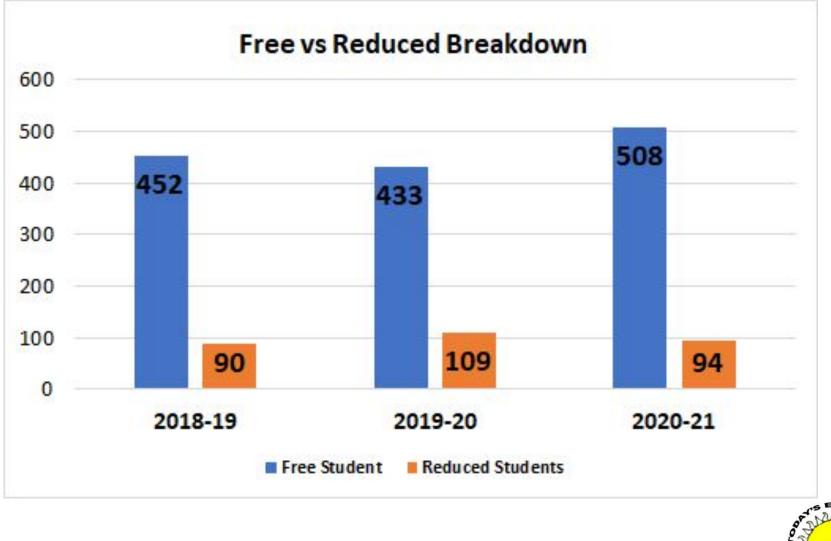

Federal Year 2020-21 District Priorities

Funding for High Quality Education Continued

- +10.23% increase (\$1.84 M to \$2.03 M) for support in student
 physical, mental, and emotional health. Budget increases were due to
 Effective School Solution expansion into Reading-Fleming
 Intermediate School and an additional 1:1 nurse. (Salaries, not included)
 - +1.24% increase (\$4.90 M to \$4.96 M) for support in operations and maintenance, specifically cleaning duct cleaning, additional cleanliness procedures, and to prepare for the custodial bid.
- +109.94% increase (418 K to 878 K) to support Curriculum balanced literacy with K-2 classroom libraries, instructional multi-year licenses, Columbia University Teachers College Readers and Writers Workshop Institutes, NGSS Science Teaching Coaching.
- School operating budgets remained overall flat (Salaries, not included).



Moving Forward: Building Evidence to Focus on Educational Innovation

HSMC Tri-County STEM Ecosystem (Hunterdon, Somerset, Mercer counties) for continued support of research, evaluation, and statistics that help educators, policymakers, and other stakeholders improve outcomes for all students

During the 2019-2020 school year we focused on Pre-School Coding through in partnership with LEGO students are engaged in early coding concepts such as sequencing, looping, and conditional coding while developing problem solving skills, critical thinking, collaboration, curiosity, and social and emotional skills.

The FY 2020-2021 District budget provides:

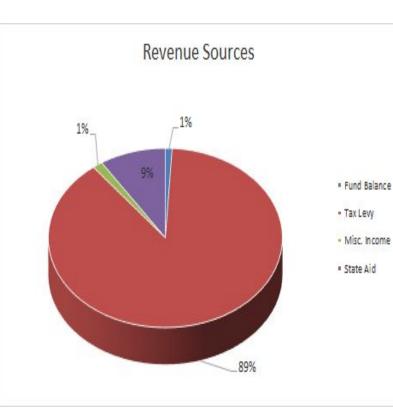
\$67 million in the General Fund Budget (\$67,275,701) These costs are predominantly instruction, providing services and transporting students in grades pre-kindergarten through grade eight.

The budget also includes administrative and business expenses for the costs such as NJSMART data management program, My Learning Plan teacher evaluation tool, curriculum writing, personnel/human resource advertisements, maintenance of facilities and communications technology.

2020-2021 Expenditures Fund 10

<u>Salaries</u> include all PK-8 teachers, media specialists, nurses, guidance counselors, secretaries and administration.

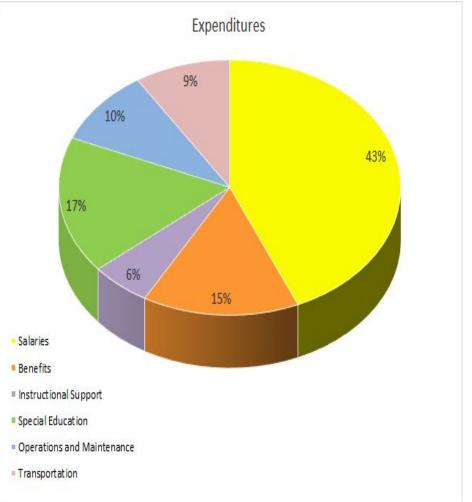
Benefits include medical, dental, prescription, workers comp, pension, social security, tuition reimbursement and additional employee benefits.

Instructional Support includes all instructional supplies, professional development and technology.

<u>Special Education</u> includes all salaries of staff involved with in-district students, plus tuition for out-of-district placements.

<u>Operations and Maintenance</u> includes salaries for maintenance personnel, contracted services for custodians, utilities, property insurance, general building supplies and maintenance and repair.

<u>Transportation</u> includes regular/special education to/from school, athletics and non-public student aid in lieu.

 - Carefully considering resources for special education
 - Ensuring highest-quality teaching to meet student needs
- Focusing on communication and collaboration
 - Ensuring stakeholders are well-informed about financial decision-making
 - Inclusive budget development process by establishing trusting, productive relationships with stakeholders.

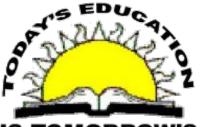
